Incentive programs to return to local food production rather than barter imported packaged foods in exchange for illegal forest timber products. Promotion of an income generating recycle bank program



Nearly 100% of the project's 64,500 hectares is a wetlands reserve, conservation of which protects some 64 billion liters of water flow per month and maintains a vital fish nursery area for the Seruyan River basin









The project works closely with the National Park Service, the Ministry of Forestry, the Forestry Service and assists communities in interfacing with government development agencies at the regional and national level.



The project successfully avoided and continues to avoid the conversion of 64.500 hectares of carbon dense, high conservation value peat forests to oil palm, thereby preventing >130 million tonnes of carbon emissions



The project constitutes 64,500 hectares of lowland peat swamp forests, one of the world's most highly endangered ecosystems. It is also the world's largest privately funded orangutan sanctuary and conserves vital habitat for more than 100 RED Listed Threatened and Endangered Species.







The project has partnered with the Orangutan Foundation International, World Education, and local, provincial and national government in order to create a sustainable foundation achievement of these goals.
